What is paraphrasing?

Paraphrasing is...

- Used to rewrite the text in your own words
- Used to clarify meaning
- Used to shorten a longer statement but keep the main ideas
- Used to avoid PLAGIARISM!

How should I make sure that I do NOT plagiarize?

- Don't change a couple of words
- Don't delete a couple of words or phrases
- Don't rearrange the order of the words

*****What is it called if you do any of the above? PLAGIARISM*****

3. Look away from the passage
4. Write about the main idea and key information only – this is a shortened version put in **YOUR own words**

<p>4) "In the early 1950s, a former ad man and modestly successful children's book author published a series of illustrated stories for children in magazines like Redbook. They were short, two-to-three page spreads with stamp-sized drawings and minimal coloring. He hoped to publish them in book form but another project gained steam. In 1957, he published a book that became an immediate best seller, turning him into a global publishing phenomenon. By approaching learning to read as zany and fun instead of boring and dull, the book altered the children's literature landscape. His name was Theodor Seuss Geisel and the book was called "The Cat in the</p>

The screenplay was by the acclaimed writer Aaron Sorkin (who also wrote "The Social Network"). And it received rave reviews ("Steve Jobs' is a rich and potent document of the times," wrote my colleague A.O. Scott.)But the movie tanked at the box office. Perhaps Hollywood had overestimated the public's fascination with the man. Perhaps the film came a couple of years too late or a couple of decades too early. <p>6) "Indian clothing is closely identified with the colorful silk saris worn by many of the country's women. The traditional clothing for men is the dhoti, an unstitched piece of cloth that is tied around the waist and legs. Men also wear a kurta, a loose shirt that is worn about knee-length. For special occasions, men wear a sherwani, which is a long coat that is buttoned up to the collar and down to the knees. <p>7) "After a few trials building cars and companies, in 1903, Henry Ford established the Ford Motor Company. Ford introduced the Model T in October of 1908, and for several years, the company posted 100 percent gains. However, more than for his profits, Ford became renowned for his revolutionary vision: the manufacture of an inexpensive automobile made by skilled workers who earn steady wages .In 1914, he sponsored the development of the moving assembly line technique of mass production. Simultaneously, he introduced the \$5-per-day wage (\$110 in 2011) as a method of keeping the best workers loyal to his company. Simple to drive and cheap to repair, half of all cars in America in 1918 were Model T's (Biography.com)."</p>
